Updated Sanitation Protocols for 2020-2021

In order to keep everyone healthy and safe, TRA has implemented the following:

1. Temperature Upon Arrival

Students will have a touchless temperature reading upon arrival each day. If a student's temperature is outside of acceptable guidelines, they will be sent home.

2. Sign-In Sheet (at the front desk)

Students may use their OWN pen to sign in OR have the front desk worker sign them in so that fewer people are using the pens. Please take into consideration the extra time this will take and make plans to get to campus early. There is a new Hand Sanitizer Dispenser on the wall right by the entrance.

3. Disinfection Procedure Throughout the day, areas frequented by students and items touched by hand will be wiped with a disinfecting wipe (microwave, doorknobs, light switches, water fountain, markers, pencils, rulers, etc.) Tables/desks will be wiped after each class.

4. Classroom Space We have enlarged our classroom spaces by knocking down walls and placing 2 portable large classrooms in the sanctuary. This will give students a little more room. We will not be able to maintain 6 feet in between, but we will all be facing the same way and the additional space gives plenty of room between the first row of desks and the teachers.

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5. Masks and Hand Sanitizer

At this time, masks will be voluntary but are strongly recommended. TRA will not provide masks. Students who wish to wear them are welcome to do so, but they must bring their own. Please make sure that your student has a container or a labeled plastic bag to put their mask in while they are eating. This way masks will not be sitting on tables and/or desks.

Students are asked to bring their own hand sanitizer as well. TRA WILL provide sanitizer in designated areas, but individual hand sanitizers will help us avoid students piling up in an area. Students will be encouraged to wash their hands frequently throughout the day.

6. Snack Shack and Lunch

In January, TRA will be offering limited options in Snack Shack. Items can be purchased with cash only. Gloves and hand sanitizer are provided at the snack table. Students are still able to bring all of their own food if they wish. TRA will not be providing lunch options at this time. We will not be offering the water and cups as we have in the past. Students can always use the water fountain, but you should send your child with his/her own water bottle. Please clearly mark each bottle with your child's name.

7. Distance Learning Option According to our Governor's summer executive order, schools are to open but offer a distance option to families who feel safer being at home. We will continue to offer Zoom options for students who are not able or comfortable attending classes on campus. Students will Zoom in at their scheduled times, be required to turn all assignments in on time through a dropbox linked to Praxi, participate in discussions and presentation just as if they were in the classroom. The price for these classes will be the same. This option will not be made available for electives. There will be limited Zoom seats available. Students must sign up for this option at enrollment and will not be able to switch back and forth weekly between on campus and at home.

SCHOLARSHIP STUDENTS Who ZOOM: Seat hours are still required for scholarship students. Zoom links are provided on Praxi for the required Guided Study classes.



8. Recent Changes in Positive Cases and Exposure Situations:

Sick children are to stay home.

The following was received from the Florida Health Department on December 4th :

DEFINITIONS:

Confirmed Case—a polymerase chain reaction (PCR)-positive case with or without symptoms

Probable Case—an antigen-positive case or a symptomatic contact of a case

Infectious Period—a case of COVID-19 is considered infectious from two days prior to symptom onset, or specimen collection date for asymptomatic cases, through 10 days later.

Close Contact—anyone who was within 6 feet of a confirmed or probable case for a cumulative total of 15 minutes or more over a 24-hour period while they were considered infectious, regardless of whether either person wore a cloth face covering or face shield. Additionally, if they shared eating or drinking utensils or had direct physical contact with the person such as hugging or kissing.

Isolation- Applies to those who are symptomatic or test positive for COVID-19 and involves staying home from work, school, and/or activities. Isolation lasts for 10 days after the onset of symptoms, and at least 24 hours fever-free without fever-reducing medication, and an improvement of other symptoms. For cases who have not had symptoms isolation lasts 10 days from the day of specimen collection for their first positive test. In rare instances (e.g., if a person was very sick or has certain serious underlying medical conditions), isolation may last 20 days. Repeat testing is not recommended to decide when to end the period of isolation. Instead, determining when to end isolation should be based on the symptom-based criteria above.

Quarantine—Applies to those who are potentially exposed and involves staying home from work, school, or other activities when a person is a close contact to someone with COVID-19. The recommended quarantine period is 14 days. The quarantine may be shortened to 10 days without laboratory testing, if daily symptom monitoring indicates the contact remains symptom free. Quarantine may be shortened to as few as 7 days if negative PCR testing is obtained on day 6 or later. Quarantined individuals released back to school before 14 days, should continue to monitor for symptoms, socially distance, practice good hand hygiene, and use a mask through Day 14. If symptoms develop within 14 days of last exposure, the contact should self-isolate, seek medical care, and get tested. Contacts testing positive within 14 days would be considered cases and the isolation criteria would apply.

School Evaluation(Excerpt)—The evaluation of the school for confirmed or probable COVID-19 cases in the K-12 school setting:

...Depending upon the case's movements and actions, the number of people considered close contacts will vary. For example, if the case was deemed to have spent limited time at the school while infectious, or strict cohorting and social distancing within the classroom is observed, very few students or teachers would need to be quarantined. If strict cohorting is done but there is prolonged contact and some close interaction in the classroom, then the teacher and all students in the classroom will likely be quarantined, and the classroom cleaned and disinfected. If the case was interacting with students and teachers throughout the school campus while infectious, then a larger number of students and school personnel may need to be quarantined.



In addition to the hourly and daily cleaning and disinfecting, an intense cleaning will take place if a case of COVID-19 has been confirmed on campus according to the guidelines provided to the school from the Health Department.
